P7

P6

Seesaw and Explain Everything are proving to be invaluable to Ms Gartland and Mrs Fleming as they send explanatory videos on new and old topics.

P5

Primary 5 have been working hard this week on equivalent fractions using a help sheet, video and their textbooks. They continue to receive a weekly timetable and email attachments of all tasks. These will also be added to the Home Learning page of the school website. We are looking forward to starting our new novels next week. Ms Kitt's class will be reading Matilda and Mrs Gorman's class will be reading Charlie and the Chocolate factory. The children have really enjoyed completing weekly novel work. We are all working away on our Human Body projects and learning lots. Ms Kitt and Mrs Gorman have loved getting photos of your wonderful work and the rainbow photos really brightened our days!

P4

Another busy week of Home Learning in Primary Four. The children are getting into the swing of using the activities in our journal their class on SeeSaw! It is great to see work and creative responses. There has been a lot of research going on for our topic on Minibeasts. Children's literacy tasks have been linked to this and they have been completing fact files and labelled drawings of a variety of creepy crawlies and bugs! Our Minibeast Fronter Room has also been updated with links to relevant eBooks and the NewsDesk children are also keen to show us all the wonderful things they are getting up to at home; painting, cooking, playing piano and sports outside. They are certainly developing all their talents whilst at home.

P3

P1

AQE Updates

Registration Update – Registration Delayed Until Thursday 14th May 2020

In the continuing uncertainty caused by Covid-19, AQE is endeavouring to provide clarity to P6 pupils and parents about the arrangements for the tests which are scheduled to take place during the next academic year. AQE's first priority in planning for the assessments is the health and wellbeing of the pupils and staff involved. Registration for parents of P6 children who will sit the AQE assessments in the Autumn was due to open on Wednesday 29th April 2020.

We continue to have discussions with key stakeholders to ensure that the best possible provision is made for applicants and, to facilitate these discussions, **registration will now open on Thursday 14**th **May.**

There has been no change to how registration will operate, following on from our communication at the end of last week; however, there are a few things that we should perhaps clarify;





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- 1. Downloadable and paper versions of the registration form are not available at the moment as we have no access to the office and therefore cannot receive them by post. However, we do intend to make these available when government restrictions are eased to allow us to facilitate both online and postal registrations.
- 2. Photographs for the registration form can be taken at home by parents but should meet the basic criteria (a clear image, taken from the shoulders up, cropped to passport size and no larger than 9MB).
- 3. Documentation to be uploaded (birth certificates / passports / FSM confirmation) should be scanned rather than photographed to ensure the full document is included, without anything else in the background and that the information on the document is legible.

PPTC 2020-21 Update

PPTC has been working closely with its Entrance Assessment provider, GL Assessment, to find ways to best support pupils who will transfer to post-primary schools in 2021 and their parents. Discussions have centred on three main areas:

1 Delaying the Assessment Date

We are working to establish if the Entrance Assessment can be delayed from mid-November 2020. This would provide all pupils with valuable additional P7 time before being assessed.

2 Delaying and extending the Registration Period

We are looking at delaying the start date for parents to register their children to sit the Entrance Assessment from mid-May to provide more time before registration decisions need to be made. We are also looking at extending the Registration deadline from mid-September 2020 to provide additional registration time when pupils are in P7.

3 Making the Entrance Assessment as accessible as possible for pupils

We are exploring different ways to take account of the current disruption to pupils' schooling, in order to help them achieve their full potential when sitting the Entrance Assessment.

PPTC will make specific information public through this website as soon we are in a position to do so. The "Information for Parents" section will subsequently be updated to include the full "2020-21 Registration Pack".
